Silent Voices Heard focuses on the hearing and speech impaired. Hearing is a vital part of our lives affecting every aspect of our daily lives. Hearing, or lack thereof, is directly connected to our speech. Think about it, when you play the game that starts with a saying and by the time it gets to the last person, it is a different saying. What did you hear and what did you say? As you can see, your hearing and speech go hand in hand.

What you hear is crucial to your well-being and health. With Grand President Julie's program, you have an opportunity to educate, help others and yourself, and understand the crisis that is affecting millions of people just in the United States.

According to Hear4Hope.org, our hearing ability can impact our health; and hearing loss is a common and widespread issue worldwide. It is currently the third-leading chronic health condition in the United States and cases are rapidly increasing. Fortunately, half of all global cases are preventable through public education, early identification, and timely treatment.

- Hearing loss affects about 60.7 million Americans age 12 and older and about 15.5% (44.1 million) of American adults age 20 and older have some level of hearing loss.
- Of people age 65 and older, 31.1% experience hearing loss, while 40.3% of adults age 75 and older experience hearing loss.
- Only 16% of people age 20–69 have ever used a hearing aid, while just 30% of those age 70 and above have done so.
- Hearing loss is on the rise in the United States and is expected to almost double by the year 2060.

- Educate, raise awareness, compassion and understanding the hard of hearing and speech impaired community.
- Universities/School Programs
 - o Look at your local schools and colleges for programs in your communities.
 - o Most elementary schools have programs to identify speech and hearing loss.
